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## Fire Dept. Receives Award of Excellence

**T**he North Richland Hills Fire Department was recently honored as the 2008 winner of the Fire Service Award for Excellence. This award is presented annually by the International Association of Fire Chiefs and the U.S. Safety & Engineering Corporation.

The North Richland Hills Fire Department received this award for its Cardiac Catheterization Lab Field Activation Program. Through this program, North Richland Hills' paramedics diagnose life-threatening heart attacks in the field and immediately activate the on-call Cardiac Cath Lab Team at North Hills Hospital. The paramedics then bypass the Emergency Room and take the patient directly to the Cath Lab, saving time and improving the patient's chances of survival. Because of this innovative program, heart attack

patients in North Richland Hills are receiving life saving treatment in less than half the time, when compared to the national standard.

In conjunction with this award, the Fire Department was presented a \$2,000 grant to be used for fire education and prevention programs.

North Richland Hills' innovative efforts to improve heart attack treatment times will be used by the International Association of Fire Chiefs as a model program for other Fire Departments to follow.

The Fire Department's Cardiac Catheterization Lab Field Activation Program was also selected as a finalist for the 2008 U.S. Conference of Mayor's City Livability Awards.

## Did You Know?

**The City Council has amended the Code of Ordinances to prohibit the tethering of dogs in North Richland Hills. Residents can no longer tie or tether dogs in their yards, unless the owner remains with the dog throughout the period of restraint. Some exceptions may be allowed for veterinary treatment, grooming, training or law enforcement activity. ## DTV Transition Taking Place in February 2009

**B**ig changes are coming to broadcast television. On February 17, 2009, all full-power broadcast television stations are required by the federal government to stop broadcasting in analog and continue broadcasting in digital only. This is known as the digital television (DTV) transition.

Not everyone will be affected by the DTV transition in the same way:

- If you have cable or satellite TV, you are already prepared for the DTV transition.
- If you watch free over-the-air TV broadcasts on an analog TV with a rooftop antenna or "rabbit ears" on your set, you will not be able to watch full-power broadcast stations after February 17, 2009 unless you get a "digital-to-analog converter box."

Digital-to-analog converter boxes are available in stores that sell electronics equipment and through various online mail order retailers. The cost for a basic converter box is between \$40 and \$70. This is a one-time cost.

The federal government is offering each U.S. household up to two \$40 coupons that can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes.

# North Richland Hills 2008 Year in Review

**N**orth Richland Hills employees worked hard during the past year to provide excellent programs and services to the community. Following is a look at some of the accomplishments and notable events of 2008.

## New Facilities

- North Richland Hills celebrated the grand opening of its new Public Library in April. The new facility includes a dynamic children's area, local history room, two community rooms, a café and state of the art technology.
- The City hired Brinkley Sargeant Architects to design the new Recreation Center. The design will take place in 2009 with construction getting underway in 2010.

## New Programs & Services

- The City entered into an agreement with the North Texas Tollway Authority to distribute TollTags at City Hall as a convenience to the traveling public. TollTags work on any toll road in the state and save motorists time and money.
- The City hosted its first Discover Project Green event in March. Residents who attended this free event learned about green living and ways to reduce their negative effect on the environment.
- The NRH Recreation Center began offering Think Green classes to educate the public about water conservation, composting, native plants, renewable energy and other Green topics. The Think Green classes were held monthly from March through August.
- Dogs and their owners enjoyed a special day at Tipps Canine Hollow Dog Park in May. The first annual Fido Fest celebration was hosted by the Parks & Recreation Department and the Tipps Canine Hollow Park Pals.
- The City launched a new program to encourage recycling at community festivals, athletic competitions and other special events.
- The Animal Adoption & Rescue Center also began a new recycling program that raises money for the shelter. Residents can participate by recycling paper in the bins located in the WalMart and Target parking lots.
- The City's Cultural Arts Division launched a new Green Teens program at Birdville High School. The program reaches out to young environmentalists through training and hands-on demonstrations, allowing them to educate their peers, as well as their community, on ways to live greener lives. The Green Teens program will expand to other schools in the future.

## New Online Services

- CitiCable NRH began streaming its broadcasts live on the world wide web. With the click of a mouse NRH residents, or anyone in the world, can view City Council Meetings, Planning & Zoning Commission Meetings and other CitiCable programs online. Log onto [www.nrhtx.com](http://www.nrhtx.com) to watch Citicable online today.

- As a convenience to residents, the City made it possible to obtain garage sale permits online.
- The Neighborhood Services Department began posting restaurant inspection scores online. There are approximately 300 restaurants in North Richland Hills. Each establishment is inspected 1 to 4 times per year. To view the latest scores go to [www.nrhtx.com](http://www.nrhtx.com).
- A "Think Green" section was added to the City's web site. This section highlights the City's efforts to protect our natural resources and to promote environmentally-friendly lifestyles and business practices.

## Other Accomplishments

- NRH celebrated the grand opening of the Venue at Home Town. The Venue includes upscale apartment homes and several new businesses including Rise & Dine, Firehouse Subs and Chapps Hamburger Café.
- The City completed 12 art installations on traffic signal boxes. The signal art program beautifies public areas, improves our quality of life and creates a distinctive identity for our community.
- The NRH Youth Advisory Committee Celebrated its 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in April.
- The City adopted a resolution encouraging the alignment of new natural gas pipelines within existing easements and roadway corridors, and not in conflict with residential neighborhoods or prime commercial properties.
- To help conserve our region's water supply, the City extended water conservation measures to year round. Outdoor watering is no longer allowed between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Sprinkler systems should be set to operate in the early morning or late evening, when the sun and temperatures are less likely to cause evaporation.
- The City began developing a Mixed Use Transit Oriented Development Code. This code will guide and encourage development around the future Iron Horse and Smithfield Commuter Rail Station sites. The code is expected to be complete by Spring 2009.

# NRH Receives Numerous Awards in 2008

**T**he **NRH Public Library** was again ranked first among Texas public libraries serving populations of 50,000 – 100,000. The rankings by Hennen's American Public Library Ratings are based on 15 different statistical measures such as circulation, staffing, materials, reference service, visits, funding, and efficiency measures.

**The City** was recognized as a Clean Air Partner by the North Texas Clean Air Coalition. This recognition was received for the City's dedication of time, resources and energy to developing programs that encourage City employees to make cleaner and smarter commutes to work each day.

The **Police Department's Traffic Section** won 28 trophies at the Gulf Coast Police Motorcycle Skills Championship. The Department brought home the 2nd Place Overall Team Award, plus numerous individual awards.

**Police Dispatcher Carissa Katekaru** was the recipient of the 9-1-1 Commission's 2008 "Silent Hero" Certificate of Achievement, which recognizes exceptional professionalism in the field of emergency communications.

**Chief Building Official Dave Pendley** was presented the Greater Fort Worth Builders Association 2008 Spirit of Cooperation Award. Dave was recognized for his commitment to provide safe, comfortable and affordable home ownership.

**Keep NRH Beautiful** received Second Place in the Governor's Community Achievement Award for Category 7 (Population 50,001 – 100,000). The award was presented by Keep Texas Beautiful.

**CitiCable NRH** was also recognized by Keep Texas Beautiful as the First Place winner in the Media Awards Commercial/Promotional category. This award recognizes the public awareness and education efforts in supporting environmental issues.

**Assistant Building Official Penny Peterson** was presented with the City's R-SPiRiT Award. The award is presented annually to the employee that best exemplifies the core values of Respect, Service, Productivity, Integrity, Responsibility, Innovation and Teamwork.

**Firefighter Steven Rucker** was named a Great First Responder by CareFlite and the North Central Texas Regional Advisory Committee.

Five out of the past seven years, **NRH<sub>2</sub>O lifeguards** have received an overall Platinum Level Award through Jeff Ellis and Associates (aquatic safety consultants who oversee the licensing of the park's lifeguard staff). This is the highest level award given out by Ellis & Associates.

Jeff Ellis & Associates also recognized **NRH<sub>2</sub>O lifeguard Allison Schaffheuser** as a Golden Guard, the highest individual honor given.

**Iron Horse Golf Course** tied for the Best Public Golf Course in the *Fort Worth Star Telegram's* 2008 Reader's Choice Awards.

**NRH Public Works employees** won several first and second place awards at a regional Public Works Equipment Road-E-O. The event was held during Public Works Week.

Standard & Poor's Rating Service upgraded the **City's credit rating** to AA. The 'AA' rating allows the City to borrow money at lower interest rates, which saves taxpayers money. North Richland Hills' credit ratings are among the top 2% of municipalities in the State of Texas and the top 10% nationwide.

The Texas Chapter of the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials awarded **Debbie Eskew** the 2008 First Line Supervisor Award. Debbie is Manager of the Police Department's Communications Section.

**Cultural Arts Coordinator Lori Newman** received the 2008 Media Excellence Award from the Texas Recreation and Park Society for the Sounds of Spring Concert Series.

**Michael Salazar, Parks & Recreation Equipment Operator**, was awarded 2nd place in the Texas Recreation and Park Society's Parks Maintenance Competition.

The **Finance Department** was presented a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Governmental Finance Officers Association. This is the 24th consecutive year the City received this award.

The City's **Budget Department** received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award with Special Performance Measures Recognition from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This is the 18th year in a row the City received this award.

**Richland Tennis Center Manager Charlotte Wylie** was presented the Texas Facility Manager of the Year Award by the US Professional Tennis Association. Charlotte has been the Manager of the Richland Tennis Center since it opened in 1997.

The award was presented by NTC Chairman and former Fort Worth Mayor Kenneth Barr during the 11th Annual Texas Transportation Summit held in Irving.

He also serves on the Coalition for Better Transportation, Regional Transit Initiative Committee, Texas Transportation Institute Advisory Council and TEX-21 Committee, as well as serving on numerous other local, state and national committees.

# NRH Program Recognized by Police Chiefs Association

**T**he North Richland Hills “Building Connections – Building Community” Family Resource Program was selected as a finalist for the 2008 Webber Seavey Award. This recognition was given on November 10, 2008 at the International Association of Chiefs of Police annual conference.

The Webber Seavey Award is presented annually to police agencies worldwide as recognition for promoting a standard of excellence that exemplifies law enforcement’s contribution and dedication to the quality of life in local communities. Projects selected for this award focus on the achievement of one or more of the following goals:

- Continually improving services to the community;
- Strengthening police relations and promoting community participation;
- Effectively using resources;
- Enhancing communications within and cooperation among agencies;
- Developing creative and innovative approaches that promote excellence in law enforcement.

The “Building Connections – Building Community” Family Resource Program is a collaborative project between North Richland Hills law enforcement, civic leaders, the school district and local religious organizations to help build family resiliency and to proactively intervene in the lives of those at risk of child abuse and neglect.

Since the initiative began, over 823 referrals have been received and 550 families have been successfully contacted. In one year, Child Protective Services’

calls decreased at least 30% in areas of the community targeted by this program.

As a finalist for the 2008 Webber Seavey Award, the “Building Connections – Building Community” Family Resource Program will serve as a blueprint to help other Police Departments develop and strengthen their agencies to make their communities safer.

# 2008 - 2009 City Budget & Tax Rate

**W**hile some cities in the region are cutting programs and services and increasing taxes, North Richland Hills' 2008-2009 budget will allow us to continue to provide the same high level of services residents have come to expect in all City Departments.

The City Council adopted the budget and set the tax rate for the 2008-2009 fiscal year during its September 8 meeting. This action came after several months of planning by City staff, a budget work session with the City Council, and three public hearings to receive input from residents. In preparing the budget, City staff kept in mind the City Council's Goals and Objectives, as well as areas of greatest needs as stated by our citizens in the 2007 Citizens Survey.

The budget provides an additional \$100,000 in funding for the Preventive Street Maintenance Program, bringing the total amount for this program to \$900,000 for the year. The goal of this annual program is to extend the life of our City streets. This year the City is taking a neighborhood approach with the street maintenance program. Rather than spreading the work out across North Richland Hills, it will be concentrated in neighborhoods that have some of the oldest streets in the City.

Funding is also provided in the budget to continue the Code Compliance Assistance Program. This program began as a pilot program in the 2007-2008 fiscal year. It includes hiring two part time, seasonal employees to assist the Code Compliance Officers during the spring and summer months, when there is an increase in high grass complaints and other property issues.

The 2008-2009 budget also absorbs increasing costs that are beyond the City's control, such as increases in gasoline, electricity, tires, engine oil, asphalt, cement, and health and medical costs. Reserves are also being restored

to maintain the City's financial integrity and to plan for future opportunities for our community.

A primary source of funding for the City budget is property taxes. This is the 16th year in a row the City has maintained the same property tax rate of 57 cents per \$100 of property value. The City property tax helps to fund 24-hour police, fire and ambulance service, maintenance of public streets and lighting, library services, park and recreation services, animal shelter services, environmental health services, and planning and development services.

The City's tax rate is only a portion of your overall property tax bill. Residents also pay property taxes to Birdville (or Keller) ISD, Tarrant County, Tarrant County Hospital District and Tarrant County College.

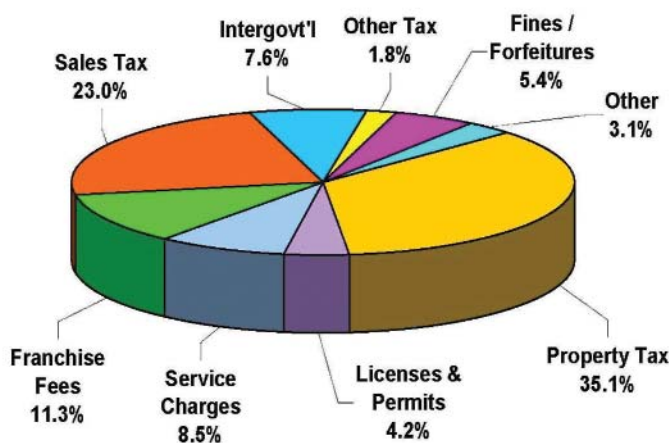
Although the City's property tax rate remains the same for the coming year, residents should note that their property tax bill will change if the appraised value of their home has changed. Sixty-three percent of North Richland Hills' single family homes maintained the same property value as last year. Property values are assessed by the Tarrant Appraisal District, and not by the City of North Richland Hills. According to the Appraisal District, the average value of a home in North Richland Hills is \$149,808 this year, compared to \$144,417 last year.

The property tax bills for senior citizens and disabled residents will not change unless they have purchased a new home or made additions to their home.

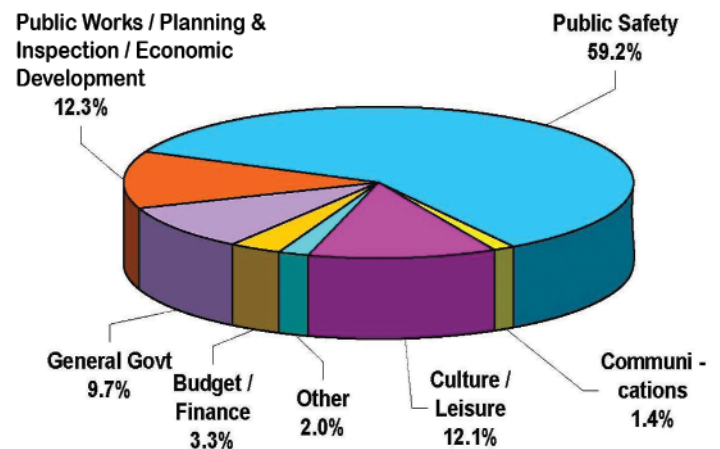

## 2008-2009 General Fund Expenditures

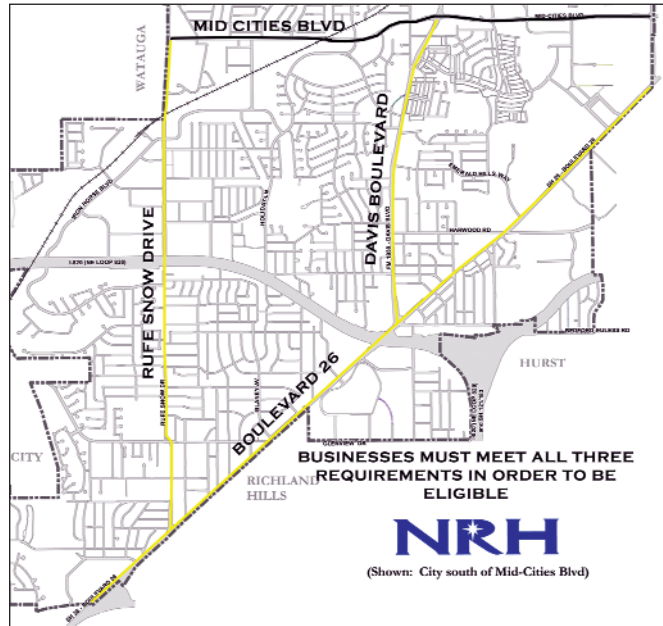


# B.I.G. Program for Small Businesses

**T**he City of North Richland Hills is proud to announce the launch of B.I.G., the Business Improvement & Growth Program. B.I.G. is a City funded program that provides technical and financial assistance to independent businesses seeking to renovate and restore their exterior appearance.

## B.I.G. Coverage Area:

- Located in North Richland Hills
- Located south of Mid Cities Boulevard
- Storefronts facing Boulevard 26, Davis Boulevard, or Rufe Snow Drive
- Businesses must meet all three requirements listed above in order to be eligible for this program



## Assistance Options:

- A 100% matching grant for storefront improvements up to **\$10,000**
- A 100% matching grant for a new monument sign up to **\$3,000**
- Up to **\$2,000** for removal of non-conforming pole signs
- Technical and design assistance for **FREE**
- This adds up to a possible value of **\$15,000**

## Eligible Projects:

Improvements covered under the B.I.G. program should provide visual interest both day and night. Every effort should be made to create a new/improved identity. To accomplish this, the following improvements are encouraged:

- New storefront construction, scaled within existing building
- Restoration of details in historically contributing or significant buildings
- Window display areas which are scaled and facilitate night viewing
- Monument signage
- Additional signage that is integrated into the architecture of the building
- Lighting that is visually appealing and appropriately illuminated signage
- Awnings or canopies that can be both functional and visually appealing
- Curbing irrigation and landscaping
- Cleaning, repainting, and/or re-siding of building
- Resurfacing and/or restriping of parking lots
- Removal of architectural barriers to public accessibility
